
STELARA® is a prescription medicine approved to treat adults 18 years and older with moderate or severe plaque psoriasis that involves large areas or many areas of their body, who may benefit from taking injections or pills (systemic therapy) or phototherapy (treatment using ultraviolet light alone or with pills).

While the symptoms of moderate or severe plaque psoriasis, including plaque thickness, scaling, and redness, appear on your skin, the condition actually begins inside your body.

Plaque psoriasisis a chronic (long-lasting) inflammatory skin condition that is caused in part by an overactive immune system. This triggers the body to grow skin cells up to 10 times faster than normal. Instead of shedding, these skin cells pile up on the surface and form raised red patches, or lesions, called plaques.

There is currently no known cure for plaque psoriasis. However, there are certain medications, including biologics like STELARA, that are used to treat moderate to severe plaque psoriasis. So stop covering up, and start looking into treatment options that may help provide relief from your symptoms of plaque thickness, redness, and scaling.

Living With Plaque Psoriasis

We understand how frustrating living with moderate or severe plaque psoriasis can be. The physical symptoms including plaque thickness, scaling, and redness are constant reminders of your skin condition.

Don't give up hope

Working with your doctor to help keep your symptoms under control is an ongoing part of living with plaque psoriasis. Work with your dermatologist to look into what treatment options may be right for you.

How Much Do You Know About Psoriasis?

- Psoriasis is the most prevalent autoimmune disease in the United States
- 125 million people worldwide have psoriasis, which is 2% to 3% of the total population, according to the World Psoriasis Day consortium
- Psoriasis can develop at any age
- Nearly a quarter of people with psoriasis have symptoms that are considered moderate to severe
- 80% of people who have psoriasis have plaque psoriasis

Plaque Psoriasis Q&A

Q: What causes plaque psoriasis?

A: The exact cause of plaque psoriasis is unknown. However, it is understood that the immune system, environmental factors, and family history can play a role. The immune system is somehow triggered, which causes a series of events to occur, including inflammation and acceleration of skin cell growth. Instead of falling off (shedding), the cells pile up on the surface of the skin, forming psoriatic plaques.

Q: How is plaque psoriasis diagnosed?

A: A doctor usually diagnoses plaque psoriasis by physically examining the skin and taking a thorough patient history. In some cases, the doctor may take a small sample of skin and examine it under a microscope.

Q: What triggers plaque psoriasis flare-ups?

A: Certain things may cause plaque psoriasis to flare. These include stress, skin injuries, strep infections, and certain medications. Weather can also trigger psoriatic symptoms, especially in cold and dry climates. During the winter, skin is robbed of moisture by both the cold and dry air, which may worsen plaque psoriasis.

Q: What treatments are available for plaque psoriasis?

A: Your doctor will prescribe a plaque psoriasis treatment for you based on many things, including the severity and location of your plaque psoriasis, your age, and your medical history. Therapies commonly used include: topical therapies, light therapies, systemic therapies, and biologics.

Q: Is it contagious?

A: Plaque psoriasis is not contagious. You cannot "catch" it from someone. Contact with someone who has plaque psoriasis does not result in transmission of the disease.



STELARA® Works Differently To Treat Plaque Psoriasis



STELARA® is a biologic medication that targets an underlying cause of plaque psoriasis — an overactive immune system. STELARA® specifically targets two proteins called IL-12 and IL-23 that are shown to be present in psoriatic plaques. By preventing these two proteins from attaching to cells in your body, STELARA® may slow down the production of skin cells and may reduce inflammation.

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Learn How STELARA® Performed In Medical Studies

STELARA® helps reduce plaque thickness, scaling, and redness

- 12 weeks after starting therapy, 7 out of 10 people taking STELARA® saw at least 75% clearer skin
- In as few as 12 weeks, 6 out of 10 people had their plaque psoriasis rated as cleared or minimal

What's more, STELARA® may also help you maintain clearer skin

- At 1 year, nearly 9 out of 10 people who initially responded to STELARA® and continued therapy maintained clearer skin
- At 2 years, 8 out of 10 people who initially saw 75% clearer skin maintained their results with continued therapy

Explore The Convenient Dosing Schedule Of STELARA®

4 doses a year after 2 starter doses


The dosing of STELARA® offers a full 12 weeks between treatments after 2 starter doses. It is an injection given under the skin by a healthcare provider as directed by your doctor at weeks 0, 4, and every 12 weeks thereafter.

- Each injection is given using a small needle
- STELARA® is available in 45 mg or 90 mg doses; your doctor will choose the right dose for you

Your healthcare provider will check your plaque psoriasis symptoms at all your scheduled dosing appointments while continually reviewing your response to treatment.

Make sure to keep all your follow-up appointments.

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IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

STELARA® is a prescription medicine that affects your immune system. STELARA® can increase your chance of having serious side effects including:

Serious Infections

STELARA® may lower your ability to fight infections and may increase your risk of infections. While taking STELARA® some people have serious infections, which may require hospitalization, including tuberculosis (TB), and infections caused by bacteria, fungi, or viruses.

- Your doctor should check you for TB before starting STELARA® and watch you closely for signs and symptoms of TB during treatment with STELARA®
- If your doctor feels that you are at risk for TB, you may be treated for TB before and during treatment with STELARA®

You should not start taking STELARA® if you have any kind of infection unless your doctor says it is okay. Before starting STELARA® tell your doctor if you think you have an infection or have symptoms of an infection such as:

- fever, sweats, or chills
- muscle aches
- cough
- shortness of breath
- blood in your phlegm
- weight loss
- warm, red, or painful skin or sores on your body
- diarrhea or stomach pain
- burning when you urinate or urinate more often than normal
- feel very tired
- are being treated for an infection
- get a lot of infections or have infections that keep coming back
- have TB, or have been in close contact with someone who has TB

After starting STELARA, call your doctor right away if you have any symptoms of an infection (see above).

STELARA® can make you more likely to get infections or make an infection that you have worse. People who have a genetic problem where the body does not make any of the proteins interleukin 12 (IL-12) and interleukin 23 (IL-23) are at a higher risk for certain serious infections that can spread throughout the body and cause death. It is not known if people who take STELARA® will get any of these infections because of the effects of STELARA® on these proteins.

Cancer

STELARA® may decrease the activity of your immune system and increase your risk for certain types of cancer. Tell your doctor if you have ever had any type of cancer.

Reversible posterior leukoencephalopathy syndrome (RPLS)

RPLS is a rare condition that affects the brain and can cause death. The cause of RPLS is not known. If RPLS is found early and treated, most people recover. Tell your doctor right away if you have any new or worsening medical problems including: headache, seizures, confusion, and vision problems.

Serious Allergic Reactions

Serious allergic reactions can occur. Get medical help right away if you have any symptoms such as: feeling faint, swelling of your face, eyelids, tongue, or throat, trouble breathing, throat or chest tightness, or skin rash.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION



Before receiving STELARA® tell your doctor if you:

- have any of the conditions or symptoms listed above for serious infections, cancer, or RPLS
- have recently received or are scheduled to receive an immunization (vaccine). People who take STELARA® should not receive live vaccines. Tell your doctor if anyone in your house needs a vaccine. The viruses used in some types of vaccines can spread to people with a weakened immune system, and can cause serious problems. You should not receive the BCG vaccine during the one year before taking STELARA® or one year after you stop taking STELARA® Non-live vaccinations received while taking STELARA® may not fully protect you from disease.
- are receiving or have received allergy shots, especially for serious allergic reactions
- ever had an allergic reaction to STELARA®
- receive phototherapy for your plaque psoriasis
- have any other medical conditions
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if STELARA® will harm your unborn baby. You and your doctor should decide if you will take STELARA®
- are breast-feeding or plan to breast-feed. It is thought that STELARA® passes into your breast milk. You should not breast-feed while taking STELARA® without first talking to your doctor.

Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Especially tell your doctor if you take:

- other medicines that affect your immune system
- certain medicines that can affect how your liver breaks down other medicines

Common side effects of STELARA® include: upper respiratory infections, headache, and tiredness.

These are not all of the side effects with STELARA. Tell your doctor about any side effect that bothers you or does not go away. Ask your doctor or pharmacist for more information.
